#### Elizabeth Burns writes:

For many years, Heythrop College was the Lead College for the University of London distance learning programmes in Divinity. When Heythrop closed, these programmes transferred to the central University of London and remain an important part of Heythrop's legacy. They have recently been completely redeveloped. It is now possible to study for a full Bachelor of Divinity programme using only resources which are available online, and every module has an Online Tutor to support students through their studies. In addition to the BD programme, students can choose to study for a DipHE (8 modules) or CertHE (4 modules) in Divinity, or a single module which could count towards a longer programme. #### **Edward Howells** writes:

Since teaching on the MA Christian Spirituality at Heythrop I have wanted to put together a course in which practitioners of spiritual direction could study some of the classic historical figures in Christian spirituality, such as Augustine, Bernard of Clairvaux, Teresa of Avila and John of the Cross, with a focus on how these teachings might inform their practice. With the help of former MA Christian Spirituality student Rev. Joanna Gallant, who has expertise in teaching courses in spiritual direction, the opportunity has arisen of putting on this new course, at Ripon College, Cuddesdon. It will be taught one day a week October 2021 – June 2022. It is intended primarily for those seeking to develop their practice of spiritual direction, with some previous experience of giving and receiving direction, but anyone interested may apply. **Kevin Alban O.Carm.** was both a former student and member of staff. He completed his MTh Systematic Theology in 2001 and his PhD in 2007.
